
NEPOKO cancellation. (bogus or true?) walter.deijnckens@skynet.be october 03.


Page 63 of A.Heim&R.Keach cancellation book indicate the existance of a postmark named Nepoko. Page 4 explains that this cancellation has **not** been found on authentic travelled covers and it is unlikely that they were ever correctly used on mail.


A few years ago I was able to purchase a small part of a stamp collection from a deceased missionary. Within this collection 4 stamps which were cancelled with Cataractes 17 mars 1895 (with 175 – 315° so false), Itimbiri 31 dec 1896, Sankuru 6 mai 1897, Stanley-Falls octo 1899 and also **NEPOKO 19 SEPT 5-6 1897** in blue. When I published this finding in the bulletin of the Studiegroep Belgisch Kongo I had a reaction of Mr P. Storm van Leeuwen stating that he has seen this cancellation at R. Keach but the stamp and the cancellation were lost in time.

I am not claiming that the cancellation Nepoko on this 5 c brown stamp is genuine but it is nevertheless an item to collect and to wonder if it is bogus or true.


Nepoko is a tributary of the Aruwimi river who ends up in the river Zaïre nearby Basoko. The present village Bafwaboka is situated on the borders of the river Nepoko. The area was first visited by a German called Wilhelm Junker (1840-1892) in the year of 1879.

In 1939 Pan American Airways started with 4 Boeing 314 Clipper flying boat planes, transatlantic flights via a southern route, starting in New-York with stops in Bermuda, Azores to Lissabon and Marseille.

The flying boat planes were named as follows: (reference: www.zpub.com/sf/history/boeing314.html)

Yankee Clipper February

Atlantic service. Inaugurated the first scheduled trans-Atlantic flight (mail only), 20-May-1939 (Port Washington, New York-Horta-Lisbon-Marseilles) Purchased by the U.S. Navy in 1942, but operated by Pan Am. Crashed and sank in River Tagus near Lisbon, Portugal on February 22, 1943

Atlantic Clipper March 1939

Atlantic service. Purchased by the U.S. Navy in 1942, but operated by Pan Am. Salvaged for parts.

Atlantic service. Inaugurated trans-Atlantic passenger service, 29-Jun-1939 (Port Washington, New York-Horta-Lisbon-Marseilles) Purchased by the U.S. Navy in 1942, but operated by Pan Am. Sold after the War to World Airways and scrapped in 1950. President Roosevelt was flown to the Casablanca Conference, to meet with Churchill and Stalin, on January 14, 1943, thus becoming the first in-office president to fly, and the 314 Dixie Clipper the first presidential airplane.



Atlantic service. Sold to the U.S. Navy in 1942. Sold to World Airways after the War and was scrapped in 1950.

The first connection from the Congo directly to the States was foreseen in November 1941. The flight with a Clipper was delate till the 12th of December 1941. A special postmark was made in a frame stating the following:

PREMIERE LIAISON CONGO BELGE ETATS-UNIS D'AMERIQUE départs Léopoldville Novembre 1941

Because of the delay another postmark was made saying: Départ reporté à Décembre 1941.


The flightroute however was now via Natal in Brazil.


A first letter to D E. Nour, Stone mtn, Georgia U.S.A. has a cancellation of Leopoldville 1 12-12-41.16. It show the above postmarks and also three postmarks from Brasil on the backside of the cover.

15 DEZ 1941 of Rio Grande do Norte in violet

17 DEZ 41 of what we think it is from Natal

20DEZ. 41 Correio aero of (Bragança?) - Para.





Although this second letter was sent at the same time as the previous cover, it did arrived in the States on the 17th of December 1941. This second cover was however closed and perhaps therefore subject to a censorship. Cancellation of Leopoldville 1 at 12-12-41.9.

The sender knew that is was impossible to sent any mail to Belgium through the normal postoffices because of the war In Europe and tried to sent this letter to Ormeignies lez Ath to Belgium via New-York.

On top of the cover it is typed Clipper Léo-New-York du 12 décembre 1941.

The two poststamps with the Premiere lialson and delayed stamp but also the poststamp in violet RETURNED TO SENDER

SERVICE SUSPENDED


Three wrappers shown that the cover was first opened at Leopoldville CENSURE CONGO BELGE and twice in the States, once by arrival OPENED BY EXAMINER 800? Form 167 and probably a second time by returning the cover EXAMINED BY 5354.



The order of 8 November 1941 n° 484/P.T. stated for the first time the postal rates with Pan American Airways for direct flytes to the States. The postal rates became effective at the 1st of January 1942. Air rate for letters and postal stationary: 15.50 fr per 5 gram weight + 3.50fr normal postage.


Cover from **Leopoldville 24-9-42** to **New-York** and censured by censor 42 in Leopoldville. Stamps 15 +2x2 fr or 19 fr, the exact rate for the U.S.A.



Registered cover from Leopoldville 1 22-8-44 and arrived in New-York 9 - 8 1944 with typewriting:

PAR CLIPPER

Censor marks at Leopoldville with censor 27 and in New-York. Stamps 7x5fr + 2x1.50fr or 38 fr total . Postal rate in 1944: reg. 3.50 fr + letter 3.50 fr + 2x5gram or 2x15.50fr=31 fr or 38 fr total.




If you want to know more about the Clippers please type in a search program Pan Am Clippers and the world of the Clippers will open for you.

The Atlantic-, Dixle-, and American Clipper stayed in service from 1942 till 1946.

On occasions one can find inscription like **Via P.A.A.** on a cover like this last cover from **Leopoldville 25-2-42** to **Rio Grande** Brazil. The letter was censured at Leopoldville 1 26-2-42 but still arrived at **24 March 1942** at Rio Grande do sul.

Postal rate: 3.50 fr letter+ 9.75 fr airrate = 13.25 fr total.



Exchange Control Cancellations of Greece on Belgian Congo Covers.

Four airmail letters from Elisabethville with dates between 1938 and 1939 show very remarkable censor cancellations which I could not initially classify. The destination each time was Celje (100 km from the Austrian border) in the present republic of Slovenia. The covers have arrival cancellations of Athens, Zemun (Belgrado) and Zagreb.

The four covers were sent as follows:

Elisabethville 11-6-1938, reverse cancelled by handstamp Athinai poste arienne 18.VI.38.13, front with exchange control cancellation showing MEN, reverse also cancelled with Zemyh 5, 3 Zemun 5 of 20.VI.38-11 and cancellation Zagreb 14, 3 of 20.VI.38.20.

Elisabethville 25.-3-1939, reverse with machine cancellation of Athinai poste aerienne 2.IV.39.15 and Zemyh 5, 3 Zemun 5-3.IV.39-13 and on the front an exchange control cancellation of Athens showing YEZ.

Elisabethville Postes 21-4-39, reverse with machine cancellation of Athinai poste arienne, front with exchange control cancellation showing MEN, reverse also with cancellations by hand of Zemyh 5, 3 Zemun 5 1-V-39-13, Zagreb 14, 3 of 1-V-39-19, Zagreb 2, 30 of 1-V-39.20 and Zagreb 2, 32 of -1.V-39.22.

Elisabethville Postes 28-4-39.24, on the reverse a machine cancellation of Athinai poste arienne, front with exchange control cancellation showing YEZ and hand cancellations on reverse of Zemyh 5, 3 - 3.939-13, Zemun 5, Zagreb 14, 3 - 8.V.39.19 and Zagreb 2, -8.V.39.21.

Thanks to Ruud Verberne, a collector of Greece stamps who provided me with a copy of the publication of the Hellenic Philatelic Society of Great Britain on Exchange control in Greece and its repercussions on philately by Ulysses Bellas (1976) I could solve the problem on these Belgian Congo covers.


To protect the national currency, in 1936 the Greece government decided to control all the outgoing and incoming international mail with foreign currency. It was forbidden to send or receive even post stamps without the necessary permission. A post office had the obligation to send all international mail to the nearest exchange control location, which would return this mail to the original post office after it was checked. For Athens it was without any doubt the Bank of Greece one University Street which was doing the control. After all it seems that only 5% of all international mail was checked.

Two distinct periods can be recognized, a first one between the years 1936 to 1941 and a second period between the years 1945 and 1951.


All four Belgain Congo covers shown, fall in the first period. In total 7 different control cancellations were used, four of them showing **MEN** and three of them showing **YEZ**. Men stands for national currency protection and YEZ stands for national exchange service.

The types shown on the four Belgian Congo covers on the next two pages are figures 10, 11, 8B and 13.
