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NEWS AND VIEWS

Birmingham Meeting A number of members and spouses managed to attend the joint meeting with the Belgian Study Circle over the weekend 14-16 September. Unfortunately, due to a delay in the issue of final arrangements, some members who had hoped to attend were unable to do so, however, we were most pleased to welcome Mr. E. Hirdler, who had come over from Miami specially for the meeting.

As has come to be the norm for these extended meetings, most members had brought along any material relevant to the subjects under discussion and the separate BCSC meetings, which were held in a most relaxed and informal atmosphere, were both extremely pleasant and instructive.

The session on the 1921 "Recuperation" issue was led by Mr. Keach, with contributions by Messrs. Hirdler and Green. Proofs and essays were displayed by Messrs. Foden and Keach. Unfortunately, a number of members left early on the Sunday, largely in order to be able to drive home in daylight as the weather was such as to make driving conditions most unpleasant, however, those who remained were very pleased to spend the additional time investigating the "Centimes Postal Rates" as presented by Messrs. Keach and Foden.

On this occasion, there were two joint sessions, dealing with mails of the First and Second World Wars respectively. For WWI, our colleagues of the Belgian Study Circle took the lead, with several fine displays. Although the BCSC members could not compete with the quantity of material shown - our President's absence was particularly notable in this respect - nonetheless some interesting material was shown, mainly by Messrs. Green and Keach, with some additional sheets from Messrs. Hoyte and Foden. In the session dealing with WWII, however, the Congo was well represented, while covers to and from Belgium were, understandably, sparse. Again Mr. Green took the lead for the BCSC and showed a large variety of the different types of censor marks and routes taken by mail from the Congo, his display being amply supplemented by material from the collections of Messrs. Hirdler Foden and Keach.

Our thanks are due to Jack Gibbs, who made all the arrangements for this successful meeting.

Next Year Preliminary arrangements are already in hand for another joint meeting in September 1985, to be held in Canterbury.

1986 This will be the Centenary of the issue of the first Belgian Congo stamps and the suggestion has been made that we should hold a major meeting and display in Belgium that year. Any ideas from members should be sent to the Secretary.

October Meeting Nine members managed to attend the meeting in Bedford College on 20 October and we were also very pleased to welcome as a guest Mr. Harry Green, who had once again accompanied our President to the gathering. A further, very welcome guest, was Mr. Francis E. Kiddle, a Council Member of the British Philatelic Federation, who had come along to present the Federation's Award of Merit to our member Mr. R. H. Keach for his services to philately. Seldom has any such award been better deserved.

Mr. Kiddle was able to stay for the display, the subject being the Surface Printed Portrait Issues, 1886 - 1894. Happily, the display was led by Mr. Keach, who also gave a most interesting and informative talk on the printing methods and other detail of the issues. Further material was shown by Mr. L. G. Green, and, between them, the presenters gave a comprehensive display of the stamps, including many complete panes, specimens and virtually all the Du Four varieties of the report-blocks and plates. Also shown were examples of most of the known forgeries of the high values. All in all, this was a most enjoyable afternoon for those present.

The annual exhibition of the Cercle Philatelique Annual Exhibition de Kinshasa (CEPHIK) will be held from 19 to 23 February 1985. The will be devoted to the history of Zaire's air mails, which will be illustrated by means of photographs and philatelic material. CEPHIK also intends to commemorate the 50th Anniversary of the first regular air mail service between Belgium and the Congo, under the patronage of Sabena and the Belgian Embassy. ZAIRE - NEW POSTAGE RATES

The postage rates were changed on 15 August, 1984. The previous rates had been in force since 17 August, 1981, except for a change which only affected international mail. This was in September, 1983, when the basic rate for an ordinary letter was increased by 1.50z to 7.50z for the first 20 grammes, while the airmail surtax was increased by 1.50z to 7.50z for each 5 grammes. Thus the cost of mailing an ordinary letter to Europe was increased by 3.00 to 15.00 zaires.

This increase has been made necessary by the devaluation of the Zairoise currency. Since August, all the postage rates have been amended:

S.S. ALBERTVILLE 2 AND ALBERTVILLE 3

We have previously thought that cancellations and cachets were each used on only one Compagnie Maritime Belge ship and that when a ship was replaced by another of the same name the new ship received new cachets and/or cancellers. The Abbe Gudenkauf has discovered that this is not universally true.

He has a post card and a cover each with the S.S. ALBERTVILLE straight line cachet, seriffed and 50mm long. Each document was posted aboard ship, one arriving at Southampton 26 October 1903 and the other at La Rochelle 26 February 1909. The former must have travelled on the S.S. ALBERTVILLE 2, which was removed from service in April 1904, and the latter on the ALBERTVILLE 3.


THE JADOTVILLE-KITWE ROAD


The mail coming from and going to Jadotville has known many problems during the Katanga secession. The Jadotville-Elisabethville road has often been cut off either by the rebellious or by the U.N. Troups. Therefore, big companies set up a way to have the mail sent to the staff who had remained in the area and to forward letters to the families in Europe. One of the firms that did this was Sogelec. It organized the transport and routing of the mail by jeeps. The departure was fixed in Jadotville. The jeeps had to drive through bush paths until they reached Kitwe, in Rhodesia. There, the mail was stamped with Rhodesian stamps and sometimes sent frank. I have found a letter obliterated in Solwezi, 18 September 1961. How did it get there? The returning of the mail took the same road. The circulars sent to the families in Europe tell very clearly how they had to do. The letters had to be sent to the R.C.B.C., firm settled in Rhodesia. There, the jeeps took the mail to Jadotville where it was distributed. The only thing the circular doesn't tell is the tariff to apply to a letter by airmail from Belgium to Rhodesia. We cannot compare it to the tariff applied for Congo because at that time, there was a preferential tariff between Belgium and its ex-colony (6fr 50 for one letter). That is the reason why the letters shown in the example are taxed in gold-francs when they come out from Belgium.

The witnesses of this adventure are categorical: they have never paid the tax. Did the Sogelec pay for them? Seeing the African situation and context at that time, I think that the tax was never paid.

If the reader of this letter had any further information about this subject, would he be so kind as to send it to the author of this article.



- The sub-post office of Baudouinville has become a principal post 1st May 1962. The auxiliary post of Kamipini has been annexed to the principal post of Baudouinville the same date.
